From Pastor Shannon...



CHRIST IS RISEN INDEED

April is here! I don't know about you, but I am excited that this month has begun. Mainly because we are officially in the season of spring and we can see signs all

around us of new life. Flowers and tree buds. Bird nests with babies. Farm yards with lambs and calves.

I think we all have said many times in the last several months that this has been a very, very long winter. One that reminded folks of long winters past. And the phrase 'polar vortex' was even used in the news and the weather forecasts. Definitely something we hope not to repeat any time soon.

As we reflect at the end of the season of Lent and move into Eastertide, we can relate to the winter moving into spring. Lent has been a time for us to ponder the recent past in our church, in our work, and in our families. Where was God seen in the places that surrounded you? Did you find yourself struggling and lost because your relationship with God was cold and dry? Did you get weighed down with busy-ness or sloth because you felt as dark as the brown grass under the snow?







From the Abrams Family in Kenya

We arrived a little over two months ago, and a lot has taken place in a short amount of time. We had some challenges just getting to our new home in a remote area of Kenya. Our household was stored in a shipping container in Nairobi when we arrived. We contacted a man about hiring his truck to haul our things to our new place. He said that would work, and we arranged to meet him at the container to load everything. The morning we were scheduled to move, however, things didn't go as planned. The trucker called us to say the truck had been delayed but was still coming. continued to the container to pull things out and get ready. After a while, we called him again to see when the truck would be arriving. He kept putting us off and after a little digging by us, he finally said that the truck would not be coming after all because it was full of potatoes. Yes, you read that right, potatoes. At this point the only things we could do was laugh. One colleague of ours commented how you just can't make this stuff up, and she is so right. If we learned anything our first term, it is this: expect the unexpected and just go with it...

As we continue to settle in at our new home and station, we have felt God's hand upon our family in so many ways. If we ever need a physical reminder of how great our God is, all we have to do is look out our living room window and see the majesty of His beautiful creation. We have been so encouraged by all of the tangible ways God reminds us of His love and provision...We have found great joy living in community with the people around us. God has given us the gift of home here among the Maasai. We feel a deep sense of peace that this is where God would have our family.

More Flood Relief Efforts

United Methodists, through the efforts of the Midwest Mission Distribution Center in Illinois, have been providing cleanup help for Iowa flood victims.

On Friday, March 15, 2019, Midwest Mission completed not one, not two, but three – yes, three – shipments from their warehouse. The first shipment went to El Rosario, Guatemala in partnership with Food for the Poor. The next two headed to Iowa, where Midwest Mission was able to fill a request for 4,032 UMCOR Cleaning Kits to help those dealing with the statewide flooding in Iowa. Midwest Mission had exactly 4,032 UMCOR Cleaning Kits onsite prepared and ready to go!

The first load went to northeast Iowa in Charles City, IA, and the second load to northwest Iowa in Hinton, IA. While filling the first load, Midwest Mission received an unexpected donation of 33 UMCOR Cleaning Kits from the Mission Committee - UMC Dunes in Grand Haven, MI. These kits were immediately put on a pallet, wrapped up and added to the second shipment for Iowa.

This outreach to Iowa showed God providing in a time of need in both small ways and BIG ways.

The Distribution Center began in 2000 and is a related ministry of the United Methodist Church. The Mission collects, makes, assembles and restores supplies for humanitarian and disaster relief. The work is done by volunteers who come from all over the U.S. to serve. The 30,000 square-foot facility is located on a 10-acre campus four miles south of Springfield, Illinois. It is the second largest of the cooperating depots in the UMCOR Relief Supply Network.

The organization partners with Food for the Poor, Franciscan Mission Warehouse, Christians in Mission and U.S. South Command, which provides humanitarian aid missions in Latin America and Africa.

Weather Devastation Elsewhere

The Midwest here in the United States is not the only location dealing with problems caused by weather conditions. Emmanuel and Florence Mefor, medical missionaries to Mutambara Hospital in Zimbabwe, recently sent word about the effects of a March cyclone where they are located:

"In the week of March 13 to 18, we experienced the tragic effect Cyclone Idai, which had originated from the Mozambique channel (around Madagascar). It continued to destroy everything on its path in Mozambique, and proceeded to Zimbabwe.

"Our District (Chimanimani) and Chipinge, bordering Mozambique, were the most affected with destruction and loss of lives. Houses were crushed, buried partially or completely covered by mudslides. Some families did not escape...

"We are one hour drive west of Chimanimani town (the District Administrative town). Several rivers originating from those mountains, and running down to near and distant communities overflowed their banks. Some of the access road bridges linking the communities were washed away.

"Around Mutambara Mission Hospital [where we serve], four bridges were washed away resulting in isolation of most communities. Now following this destruction, patients' access to hospital is difficult. Victims of the cyclone can only reach us by helicopter. Others are airlifted to other hospitals where they are stabilized before being taken to specialists by road.
